

I FOUND A QUILTED HEART

Would you like to create handmade quilted hearts to participate in this project? The original heart is in the photo on the left and we use it as inspiration for the IFAQH hearts. Hearts are made of fabric, generally the size of your palm, and can be any shape of heart you choose. Most have a layer of batting or fiberfill and you can embellish with buttons, sequins, ribbon, etc. Have fun with your creative process!

After creating your hearts, print and attach the following tag: <u>LINK TO IFAQH PRINTABLE TAG.</u> (Free, for personal printing)

If you cannot print the tag, please hand write only the following information:

I Found A Quilted Heart

*Do not add any other words to the tags or to the hearts. Embellishments should not have text. Tags should be plain text, without images.

Now that your heart is tagged, it is time to be placed in a public place to be found by a random stranger. Here are some of the rules:

- Do not hand, give or gift hearts to people. (Hearts need to be "found.")
- Do not leave hearts on personal or private property, such as a front porch, vehicle, door, bicycle, mailbox, gate, little libraries, etc. (Not public)
- Do not leave hearts in a cluster, like a giving tree. (Not random)
- Do not leave hearts in places that are not public: hotel rooms, work desk, break rooms, office, private retreat, etc. (Not public)
- Do not leave hearts inside any kind of retail store or on retail displays. (Can be mistaken for merchandise.)
- Do not leave hearts in airports. (Homeland security does not approve!)
- Do not leave hearts in National Parks, Wilderness, Forests, Monuments, Bureau of Land Managements, or other Federal Public Lands areas. (*Federal Regulation Title 36, 2.22 (a)*)
- Do not leave hearts in bathrooms, restrooms, washrooms, etc. (Unsanitary)
- Do not leave in places where they may be thrown away by staff. (Super Sad)

Examples of good places to sow hearts: A local park, hiking trail, highway rest stop, community center, outdoor shopping center, town square, foyer of public place, community bulletin board, beach, nature trail, museum, tourist attraction, trees, bushes and fences in downtown areas, etc. Be imaginative and creative when looking for just the right public place to sow a heart and have fun!





Fun Facts about Missouri

- *The official grape of Missouri is the Norton. (It is one of the only two states to have an official grape).
- *The Missouri State Amphibian is the Bullfrog.
- *Missouri state dinosaur is the Hypsibema missouriensis
- *The first successful parachute jump from a plane was made at Jefferson Barracks in St. Louis on March 1, 1912.
- *In Excelsior Springs, Missouri it's against the law to worry squirrels.
- *In Missouri, you need a permit if you want to shave while driving.
- *Women are not allowed to wear corsets in Missouri.
- *In Columbia, Missouri clotheslines are banned.
- *In University City, Missouri it's illegal to honk another's horn.
- *In Marceline, Missouri minors can buy rolling paper and tobacco but not lighters.
- *In Natchez, Missouri you aren't allowed to give beer or other intoxicants to elephants.
- *The Missouri River is the world's 15th-longest river.
- *The Missouri River, longest tributary of the Mississippi River and second longest river in North America.
- *The Missouri River flows for 2,342 miles from the Rocky Mountains through the states of Montana, North Dakota, South Dakota, Nebraska, Iowa, Kansas, and Missouri.
- *The Missouri River joins with the Mississippi River in St. Louis, Missouri.
- *Missouri was claimed by both the Union and the Confederacy, had two rival state governments, and sent representatives to both the United States Congress and the Confederate Congress.
- *The largest city in Missouri by population is Kansas City.
- *Kansas City has more miles of boulevards than Paris and more fountains than any city except Rome.
- *In Kansas City, it's not allowed to have a bathtub with legs resembling animal paws.
- *Russell Stover, the largest maker of boxed chocolate in the world, has been based in KC since 1932.
- *Kansas City has over 200 fountains, giving it the nickname The City of Fountains.
- *The Plaza Christmas lights tradition started with a strand of 16 lights over a doorway in 1925.

Fun Facts about Missouri (Continued)

- *The Kansas City Royals got their name from the American Royal, the livestock show that's been held in KC since 1899.
- *Kansas City has more barbeque restaurants per capita than any other US city.
- *In 1849, a cholera epidemic struck St. Louis, killing over 4,000 people.
- *Aunt Jemima pancake flour was invented in St. Louis in 1889. It was the first ready -mix food to ever be sold commercially.
- *St Louis, Missouri is home to the tallest manmade monument in the US: the Gateway Arch is 630 feet tall. It was completed on October 28, 1965. The monument is known as the "Gateway to the West."
- *St. Louis; is also called, "Home of the Blues".
- *It's illegal to run in St. Louis if you're a milkman while working.
- *It's illegal to sit on the curb of any city street in St. Louis and drink beer from a bucket.
- *St. Louis hosted the 1904 Summer Olympics—the first Olympic Games ever held in the U.S.—at the same time as the World's Fair.
- *Iced tea was invented at the St. Louis World's Fair in 1904, when Richard Blechyden, served tea with ice for the first time.
- *Ice cream cones made from waffles were first invented in St. Louis at the World's Fair when an ice cream vendor ran out of cups. The vendor asked a waffle vendor to roll waffles to hold the ice cream, and created one of the most loved sweet treats in the world.
- *The 1904 World's Fair in St. Louis also introduced cotton candy and Dr Pepper.
- *Mark Twain was born in Florida, Missouri in 1835 (his given name was Samuel Langhorne Clemens). He is most famous for writing The Adventures of Tom Sawyer and Huckleberry Finn.
- * Jesse Woodson James, better known as the outlaw Jesse James was born in Kearney, Missouri in 1847
- *Writer, poet, and civil rights activist Maya Angelou is from Missouri. She is most famous for writing I Know Why the Caged Bird Sings.
- *Laura Elizabeth Ingalls, writer of Little House on the Prairie grew up in Missouri.
- *Daniel Boone lived longer in Missouri than in any other state and regarded Missouri as his home.
